Subj: RESTRICTION OF MOVEMENT FOR ARRIVING PERSONNEL

1. Purpose. The Commanding Officer (CO) Marine Corps Base Hawaii (MCBH) has the inherent authority and responsibility to maintain good order and discipline and to protect all Department of Defense (DoD) personnel and property aboard the installation, to include protection of DoD personnel from infection by communicable diseases. This Bulletin outlines guidance and sets policy for COVID-19 mitigation that applies to DoD Service Members, DoD civilian employees, DoD contractors, and dependents arriving to MCBH from outside of Hawaii. The COVID-19 exposure risk associated with commercial air travel to Hawaii necessitates that Restriction of Movement (ROM) measures are implemented to protect mission-critical operations and essential services.

2. Cancellation. MCBH Bulletin 6210 dated 13 Jul 20.

3. Background

a. References (a) through (e) provide guidance with widespread applicability. By direction of CO, MCBH and in accordance with current policies, all DoD Service Members, DoD civilian employees, DoD contractors, and dependents arriving to Hawaii shall be placed under a 14 day ROM, starting from the day of arrival, in order to prevent or limit the spread of COVID-19. Per reference (a), military commanders will act in accordance with the applicable provisions of public health emergency declarations made by U.S. public health officials at the federal, state, and local levels. Per reference (f), all military Service Members traveling to Hawaii for official business is not subject to State of Hawaii order to self-quarantine. Arriving Service Members

must check with their gaining command for current orders and policies regarding restriction of movement. All U.S. military installations on Oahu, in accordance with USINDOPACOM guidance outlined in reference (d), are currently implementing a 14 day ROM policy for personnel arriving to Hawaii.

b. ROM Definitions

(1) Conditional Release. A person who has travelled from/through a CDC THNs level 2 or 3 country, conducted trans-Pacific travel, or conducted inter-island travel will follow the ROM instruction of restricted movement and social distancing procedures.

(2) Quarantine. A person who has been in direct contact with a person with known COVID-19 or in direct contact with a person who is awaiting test results for COVID-19 and is categorized as a PUI. Medical term referring to the separation of personnel from others as a result of suspected exposure to a communicable disease. For the world-wide COVID-19 epidemic, this should be imposed on those with no COVID-19 symptoms who have either recently returned from a high-risk location (CDC Travel Health Notice (THN) Level 2 or 3), or have had close contact with a known COVID-19 positive patient. Close contacts are defined as within 6 feet for 15 minutes. The current recommended quarantine period is 14 days. Per CDC, “Quarantine in general means the separation of a person or group of people reasonably believed to have been exposed to a communicable disease but not yet symptomatic, from others who have not been so exposed, to prevent the possible spread of the communicable disease.”

(3) Isolation. A person diagnosed with COVID-19 or a person who is awaiting test results for COVID-19 and is categorized as a Person Under Investigation (PUI). Medical term referring to the separation of personnel from others due either to the development of symptoms suspicious for COVID-19 or as a result of a positive COVID-19 test. Per Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), “isolation means the separation of a person or group of people known or reasonably believed to be infected with a communicable disease and potentially infectious from those who are not infected to prevent spread of the communicable disease.”

4. Actions

a. Personnel assigned to ROM shall:

(1) Follow applicable guidance contained in references (a) through (d), subject to enforcement by administrative and criminal penalties.

(2) Adhere to guidance from gaining command on specific ROM requirements and policy.

(3) Self-monitor to check for fever, cough, difficulty breathing, or any other COVID-19 symptoms. Consult a competent medical authority (CMA) if experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms. Immediately notify a supervisor or command representative if a CMA administers a COVID-19 test.

(4) Avoid close contact with others.

(5) Not conduct leisure travel, visit public or crowded areas, or use public transportation.

(6) Remain in quarters or temporary residence, limiting contact with other residents. Appropriate face coverings shall be worn by all ROM personnel as directed. Access to messing facilities, exchanges, food courts, fitness centers, and other shared facilities is prohibited.

(7) No-contact takeout, drive-through, and delivery food options from various services are authorized provided social distancing measures are maintained.

(8) Personnel assigned into Isolation or Quarantine shall not exit their assigned quarters for any reason until medically cleared to do so. Personnel assigned into Conditional Release may exit quarters for mission-essential official duties (as determined by commanders), to access laundry facilities, MCBH Commissary (limited to one person per household), conduct outdoor exercise, visit designated smoking areas, and conduct other essential tasks not in a public setting provided they maintain social distancing greater than six feet from others.

(9) Active Duty Members, living on or off-base, and residents living on MCBH will be placed in ROM-Conditional Release if hosting ROM personnel in their domicile.

(10) DoD civilians and DoD contractors should report if hosting trans-Pacific travelers in their domicile.

b. MCBH Subordinate and Tenant Commanders should support DoD Service Members and their dependents arriving to MCBH by completing the following actions:

(1) Issue written ROM orders that incorporate or exceed DoD ROM restrictions and those issued by Federal, State, or local public health agencies. ROM measures given to civilians shall be by direction of the CO, MCBH.

(2) Ensure all Service Members, dependents, DoD civilians, and DoD contractors newly arrived from out of state are reported in DPAR as ROM-Conditional Release. Dependents and civilians under 14 day ROM-Isolation and ROM-Quarantine will not be authorized to enter MCBH during the ROM period, except to receive medical care.

(3) Assign each individual or family executing PCS orders to MCBH a sponsor. The sponsor is responsible for ensuring command guidance on specific ROM requirements is disseminated and understood.

(4) Ensure DoD Service Members and their dependents arriving to Hawaii have sufficient access to food, water, medical care, and other necessities for the duration of ROM.

(5) Address violations of ROM measures by DoD Service Members as appropriate; refer suspected violations by civilians to MCBH Provost Marshal's Office.

c. Non-Hawaii based military units and detachments requiring trans-Pacific travel and members that provide contracted services which require trans-Pacific travel to MCBH shall comply with ref (e) and notify the CO, MCBH of their operations and/or training and comply with all COVID-19 mitigation measures.



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
